He was a devoted son, brother, nephew, cousin, friend, and boyfriend and was loved by many. He was very outgoing and brightened up a room when he entered. He had a keen sense of humor and loved to make people laugh. Carter attended Clemson University from 2012 to 2016 where he received a posthumous Bachelor of Science degree in biology in May 2017. Carter excelled in his field of biology at Clemson and earned a 4.0 in his major putting him on the President's list. The Clemson University President called Carter "a treasure to Clemson who will be sorely missed." Carter was excited about continuing his education by attending medical school. He planned to become a physician and continue to help others in health care in the future.
